St Columba's and St Peter's, Edinburgh **Fifth Sunday of Easter Year B** 28 April 2024

The allegory of the vine and the branches stresses the unity that exists between Christ and his disciples. Christ is the vine and the disciples are the branches. Vine and branches need one another – the vine cannot bear fruit without the branches and branches cannot have life if separated from the vine. The Father is the vinedresser; the branches need to be pruned (by trials) in order to become fruitful (Paul is a good example). By their fruitfulness they will bring glory to the Father, and prove themselves disciples of Christ. Jesus wrote no books. He left no buildings or monuments behind. He did something greater—he built a community. That was his `monument'. `I am the vine, you are the branches' . This was the image he used to describe the

This was the image he used to describe the community he had founded. It is a simple but profound illustration of unity, closeness and interdependence. The branches need the vine. That is obvious. Cut off from the vine the branches whither and die. Just as the branches need the vine so we need Christ. But the vine also needs the branches. It is the branches that produce the fruit. This means that Christ also needs us. He depends on us to produce fruit in the world. Jesus didn't ask us to be successful—only fruitful. In the bible the word `success' never appears. Instead `fruitful' and 'bearing fruit' - fruitfulness often comes from weakness and vulnerability and frequently goes unrecognized and unrewarded. **Flor McCarthy SDB**

Pope Francis has nominated 2025 to be a Holy Year with the theme of Pilgrims of hope. The logo shows four stylized figures, representing all of humanity, coming together from the four corners of the earth on pilgrimage. They embrace each other to indicate the solidarity and fraternity which should unite all peoples. The figure at the front is holding onto the cross. It is not only the sign of the faith which this lead figure embraces, but also of hope, which can never be abandoned, because we are always in need of hope, especially in our moments of greatest need.

The Scottish Prison Service. A summary of a talk given by Deacon Kenny to St. Columba's on 16 March 2024

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In the 14 April newsletter we shared that St. Columba's recently hosted Deacon Kenny McGeachi, • a Prison Chaplain, to talk about the Prisoners Week Trust. An independent charity which exists to support prisoners, their families, those released from prison and their families. Below is more information about the talk given by Deacon Kenny.

The prisons in Scotland accommodate 800 prisoners, 250 of whom are women. Deacon Kenny shared that Chaplaincy is about offering a window of hope for a better world - and that the work begins the moment people enter prisons. We heard that the attitude of ٠ society towards prisoners is punitive, focused on punishment rather than addressing root causes. That prisoners are often the most vulnerable and for those • committing only petty offences Sheriffs have few options, other than prisons - which are the only safe places. The adverse effects of prison on families, especially children, is a big problem, currently there are 20,000 children with parents in prison. Scotland is doing well with HMP Stirling being a model for women offenders allowing family visits so as not to break family relationships.

The aims of the prison service are threefold: Unlocking potentials and transforming people's lives; forming relationships and instilling good values of Respect, Integrity, Humility, Belief, Openness, Compassion and Innovation

The works of the Chaplaincy include the following: ٠ 1. Religious Care

- people can practice the religion/belief of their choice with Mass, the sacraments and regular church and other services of worship offered by qualified representatives of a particular faith.
- peoples' rights not to practice a religion/belief are respected and a person is not dissuaded from the practice of their religion/belief of their Charter (for more details please see information at choice

2. Pastoral Care (60-70% of Chaplaincy work)

responding to those who are in distress by request or through referrals from Officers, Mental Health, Addictions, NHS, Social Workers and spending time actively listening in a nonjudgemental, compassionate way and accepting a person as they are at that point in time

following up on concerns raised by families supporting residents and family members following a death in custody and supporting staff in times of distress or loss and especially following Death in Custody

3. Spiritual Care (15% of Chaplaincy work)

listening to where people are in their life journey, helping them to reframe their narrative through purposeful conversations and introducing role models through chaplain's behaviours and attitudes

promoting restorative justice by raising awareness of the impact of harm caused to victims, families and themselves

sign-posting people to resources and providing religious care for those who choose this path of spirituality

supporting re-integration into communities and families

There are challenges and for the Chaplin which include:

suicide prevention / self-harm, poor mental health and vulnerable people first night in prison / induction – when people feel hopeless or lost bereavement care and palliative care – people encountering dying and death people who need protection or separation people feeling frightened or angry specific traumatized groups—women, young people, older people, people in recovery understanding the problem underneath the traumas and behaviours, the why they do this, offering alternative approach to society that condemns and wants to punish.
