The Epiphany of the Lord 4 January 2026

For Matthew, the story of the magi becomes an anticipation of the fate of the good news of salvation, a fate that he knew in the aftermath of the resurrection.

God revealed himself to the Jews through the scriptures, and to the Gentiles through nature. Hence Matthew shows the Magi (who were Gentiles) receiving a revelation through astrology. The story highlights the paradox: the Jews who have the scriptures reject Jesus, while Gentiles come and, with the help of the scriptures, find and adore him.



St. Peter's Parish Council has started a project to help vulnerable people in India, through our partner, the St. Agnes charitable foundation, who help the poorest Indian children living in some of the worst conditions. We aim to **raise £500 in January to pay school fees** for poor children (the St. Agnes foundation would provide the schooling).

£75 will cover a year's school fees and needs for one child. The average price of a coffee in Edinburgh is £3.50, 21 cups of coffee is equal to the fee for a school year. Could you pay the price of a coffee towards the school fees of a child in India or buy a jar of redcurrant jam or some cacti for your home? All this can be done **mid-January** (date to be announced soon) when St. Peter's Parish will have a charity stand for the donations and the sale of the jams and plants. We can't help everyone and solve all problems everywhere but maybe we can help fellow Catholics in a country which is not covered by large international organisations. Some biblical reflections for the Solemnity of the Holy Family:

- **Respect for Parents:** Sirach 3:2-6 emphasises honouring and respecting parents. This respect strengthens family bonds and reflects God's commandment.
- **Compassion and Kindness:** Colossians 3:12-13 calls for compassion, kindness, humility, and patience. These virtues help maintain harmony and love within the family.
- **Forgiveness:** Colossians 3:13 urges families to forgive one another. Forgiveness heals relationships and brings peace to the household.
- **Love and Unity:** Colossians 3:14 speaks about love as the bond of perfection. Love holds the family together and fosters unity.
- **Teaching and Admonishing:** Colossians 3:16 encourages teaching and admonishing one another with wisdom. Sharing wisdom and guiding each other helps the family grow in faith and virtue.
- **Obedience and Understanding:** Luke 2:51 shows Jesus being obedient to Mary and Joseph. Obedience and understanding in the family build trust and respect among members.
- **Parental Responsibility:** Sirach 3:12-14 reminds parents of their duty to care for their children. Parents have a responsibility to nurture and guide their children in faith.

Patience and Gentleness: Colossians 3:21 warns fathers not to provoke their children. Patience and gentleness from parents foster a supportive and loving environment.

Prayer and Worship: Luke 2:41-52 describes the Holy Family going to Jerusalem for the Passover. Regular prayer and worship together strengthen the family's relationship with God.
